Springtime: A Season to SPRING Clinical Pharmacy Forward!



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Winter is fading and spring is starting to emerge! With the challenges faced by so many recently, this year's transition to *spring*, with its bright sun and gentle rains fostering new growth, seems more

refreshing and inspiring than ever. This is the time of year when those of us who recognize daylight savings time "spring forward" by setting forward our clocks 1 hour, allowing more light in the evening. For me, spring puts a little spring in my step, providing a burst of energy to accomplish more both physically and mentally. For ACCP, this spring in our step comes at the perfect time. Our work to develop, advance, and position clinical pharmacists in the current health care environment is under way, and our Board of Regents, practice and research networks (PRNs), committees, and task forces are making significant strides in achieving the goals set forth for this year. I am excited to share some ACCP highlights with PRNs that I hope will encourage and inspire them to think about additional ways to spring forward clinical pharmacy in their practice and research areas.

ACCP recently welcomed two new PRNs – the Health Equity PRN and the Community-Based PRN. The Health Equity PRN is focused on promoting equity across practice settings and facilitating educational, leadership, and research opportunities for those interested in reducing health disparities. I encourage you to follow the Health Equity PRN on Twitter at @accphleqprn to learn more about the network and its current activities. Formation of this PRN aligns with ACCP's broad commitment to embrace diversity and inclusion and create a culture of belonging.

In addition to the activities of the Health Equity PRN, the ACCP Task Force on Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion will provide input to the Board of Regents this year on implementing the College's DEI plan, which will include recommendations regarding PRN engagement and communication. The Research Affairs Committee is developing an ACCP commentary to address opportunities for clinical pharmacists to pursue health disparities research. The work of these groups will help inform ACCP's DEI efforts and the DEI activities of each PRN. ACCP leadership welcomes your PRN's input as the College continues to implement the DEI plan.

The most recently formed PRN is the Community-Based PRN, which creates a home for ACCP members practicing in community settings. This PRN is currently focused on developing high-quality educational programming and supporting community-focused, practice-based research. Creation of this PRN was recommended by the ACCP-impaneled Community-Based Practice Advisory Panel and is in accordance with the direction of the College's Strategic Plan to support clinical pharmacy in community pharmacy settings. To further advance work in the community setting, one of this year's Clinical Practice Affairs committees is preparing a white paper that identifies and documents the outcomes of longitudinal collaboration between community- and clinic-based pharmacists.

I want to express my thanks to the inaugural and current officers of these two new PRNs – we are grateful for your leadership and willingness to pave the way for growth and future success in your respective areas of emphasis. We hope these formal networks will not only stimulate practice and research activities, but also provide opportunities for meaningful collaborations with other PRNs.

The presidential theme for this year is "Advocacy to Advance Our Profession!" In the President's Column of the <u>January ACCP Report</u>, I highlighted key components of ACCP's advocacy platform and collaborative initiatives that are positioned to move the College's advocacy work forward. ACCP is actively engaged as a member of the

Joint Commission of Pharmacy Practitioners, contributing to the development of policies to guide the profession. ACCP also has leadership roles in coalitions promoting health care reform and medication optimization, such as the Get the Medications Right Institute and the Primary Care Collaborative. Every level of health care delivery has experienced the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic, and the profession has responded in an incredible way to this public health emergency. ACCP has worked collaboratively with other national pharmacy organizations on several joint statements, comments, and letters of support for pharmacy initiatives related to this public health emergency. Advocacy has never been more important, and I encourage each of you to learn more about the College's initiatives and how you and your PRN can advocate to advance and position clinical pharmacists to optimize care for the patients we serve. In 2019, ACCP launched the Political Action Committee (PAC) Captains Initiative, which identifies a leadership team to serve as liaisons to enhance communication between the PRNs and ACCP-PAC. This network of ACCP advocacy leaders provides a structure through which PRN members can engage to better understand how ACCP-PAC supports the College's broad advocacy strategy. I hope you will tap into these resources and explore ways to be involved in advocacy for our profession.

How exciting it will be to return to in-person meetings soon! The 2022 ACCP Spring Forum is scheduled for April 23–24 in St. Louis, and the 2022 ACCP Global Conference on Clinical Pharmacy will be held in San Francisco, October 15–18. I hope you will mark your calendars and start planning for an amazing time together for educational programming, networking, and in-person PRN activities at future ACCP meetings!

ACCP's PRNs are positioned at the heart of the College. Many thanks to each of you for your commitment to ACCP and your dedicated work to achieve the goals of your PRN and the College. As we transition to this new season, I encourage each PRN to continue to explore ways to spring clinical pharmacy forward in their respective practice and research areas. Like the lyrics from the famous Beatles tune, "It's been a long, cold, lonely winter. It feels like years since it's been here. [But] here comes the sun. And I say, it's all right." I hope each of you find this sun - and that it renews your commitment to the important work of your PRN and inspires you to explore new opportunities and collaborations. It is an honor to serve with you and other ACCP leaders, and I look forward to the successes ahead as we advocate for the future of our profession!

ACCP has been committed to excellence in clinical pharmacy practice, research, and education for more than 40 years and has an outstanding reputation for providing premier resources to advance clinical pharmacist careers. Whether you are thinking about taking the next step in your career or recruiting for your own clinical pharmacy team, the ACCP Career Center is ready to meet your needs.

The ACCP Career Center, powered by Madgex Job Board Technology, provides an intuitive searching experience on desktop and mobile devices. The center hosts searchable employer profiles and offers candidates relevant job search results and customizable job alerts.

Employers will find diverse recruitment packages to choose from that include publicizing their open positions on the ACCP webpage and within the ACCP Report and ACCP journal space. Position listings can also be advertised on ACCP's social media platforms and to specific PRNs. In 2021, positions with PRN upgrades received more than twice as many views and applications as in previous years. Employers will also want to create an employer profile to attract potential candidates. ACCP members will receive a 50% discount on all position listing packages and upgrades.

In addition to access to an <u>easily searchable list of open positions</u>, job seekers can sign up for job alerts that meet their specifications. They can also create a profile and upload a curriculum vitae, allowing them to apply to open positions directly within the ACCP Career Center platform.

Moreover, the <u>ACCP Career Center</u> hosts a variety of career development resources: news, meetings, articles, and study materials. The ACCP Career Center is **the** place for clinical pharmacy career advancement.

ACCP's Continued Focus on Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion

ACCP remains steadfast in its commitment to create and sustain a culture of diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI). Embracing diversity and inclusion to fully achieve the College's mission is an ACCP core value and a strategic direction in the 2020 ACCP Strategic Plan, which underscores the prioritization of these initiatives. In December 2021, the ACCP Strategic Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Plan was released. Informed by the College's DEI consulting firm, Ameli Global Partnerships; the ACCP membership baseline DEI assessment; and over 18 months of intensive professional development in DEI, the dynamic plan outlines the initial priorities, goals, and objectives for this ongoing work.

ACCP's baseline DEI member assessment, administered in June 2021, represents an early component of the DEI plan. Completed by 1000 ACCP members, the assessment yielded results that serve as a representative sample of demographics and inclusion experiences within the organization. A formal recorded presentation of assessment results is available to all ACCP members within

their respective accp.com account under "My Links."

Following is a sample of additional components of the
DEI plan that are under way.

- The 2022 Task Force on DEI was impaneled and charged with providing input to the ACCP Board of Regents on implementing the DEI plan. The task force is currently working to increase the diversity of nominations for elected office, awards, and FCCP; provide guidance for PRNs on incorporating DEI principles into focus session programming, speaker selection, and nominations; create a plan to collect additional member demographics; and explore opportunities to learn more about member needs.
- The 2022 Member Relations Committee was impaneled and charged with developing a report to the Board of Regents on how ACCP might address barriers to under-represented individuals wishing to pursue careers in clinical pharmacy – emphasizing ways to reach, mentor, and engage students, trainees, and practitioners who may not yet be actively involved in (or familiar with) ACCP.
- The ACCP Code of Conduct was implemented with a requirement for members and nonmembers engaged in College activities to complete an attestation statement at least annually.

To ensure responsiveness and sustainability, ACCP will employ ongoing monitoring and revision of the DEI plan. A formal reassessment is scheduled for late 2022, and additional action plans will follow. Throughout, plan implementation and monitoring will be driven by the Board of Regents, the ACCP staff, and member engagement (e.g., 2022 Task Force on DEI, 2022 Member Relations Committee, and PRN leadership). Ongoing DEI efforts



and results of informal and formal plan assessments will routinely be communicated to ACCP members.

2022 Preparatory Review and Recertification Products for Home Study

ACCP will offer home study review and recertification courses in the following nine specialties in 2022:

- Ambulatory Care Pharmacy*
- Cardiology Pharmacy*
- Critical Care Pharmacy
- Emergency Medicine Pharmacy*
- Geriatric Pharmacy*
- Infectious Diseases Pharmacy*
- Oncology Pharmacy*
- Pediatric Pharmacy
- Pharmacotherapy
- Solid Organ Transplantation Pharmacy* (not available for recertification credit)

*ACCP collaborates with ASHP on ambulatory care pharmacy, cardiology pharmacy, emergency medicine pharmacy, geriatric pharmacy, infectious diseases pharmacy, oncology pharmacy, and solid organ transplantation pharmacy activities.

Developed by leading board-certified pharmacists and therapeutic specialists, each course comprehensively reviews the domains outlined in the relevant specialty certification examination content outline developed by the Board of Pharmacy Specialties (BPS). All courses use a case-based approach, covering all key content areas, with a strong emphasis on the thought processes needed to solve patient care problems in each therapeutic area. Except for the review course for Solid Organ Transplantation Pharmacy (which was only recently approved as a new specialty), each course is BPS approved as one component of a professional development program that can be used as an alternative to the written recertification examination. Board-certified oncology pharmacists must complete the review course for recertification at least once, but no more than three times, in nonconsecutive years, during a 7-year recertification cycle. For all other specialties listed earlier, the respective course can only be completed for recertification credit up to two times, in nonconsecutive years, during the 7-year recertification cycle.

The 2022 home study review and recertification courses will be released according to the schedule that follows.


ACCP Advocacy Leadership Opportunity: PRN PAC Captains Overview

Since opening its Washington, D.C., office in 2000, the College

has invested heavily in its government affairs advocacy initiatives aimed at securing coverage and payment for clinical pharmacists' services.

This investment recognizes the need to differentiate and distinguish the practice of clinical pharmacy while working to integrate, advance, and position ACCP members to fully contribute their unique expertise in a rapidly evolving health care landscape.

The ongoing investment in ACCP's Washington office prioritizes a team-based, collaborative advocacy strategy. ACCP combines a significant portfolio of intraprofessional work alongside its colleague pharmacy organizations, with a range of interprofessional activities in collaboration with



ACCP's strategy would amend Section 1861 of the Social Security Act to add "qualified clinical pharmacists" as recognized providers under Medicare definitions. But the strategy goes beyond "provider status." Quite simply, establishing meaningful coverage at the appropriate payment levels for the complexity of work that clinical pharmacists deliver in team-based environments requires more than just a technical amendment. A comprehensive approach to patient care requires a comprehensive advocacy strategy.

ACCP is confident this investment is worthwhile. It has allowed the College to establish itself as a significant political force in policy discussions related to medication optimization in team-based care structures.

ACCP PRN PAC Captains

Given feedback from PRN leaders, ACCP determined that it hadn't successfully established a clear understanding within the ACCP membership regarding what ACCP's political action committee (PAC) was and why it was important for the College's advocacy efforts.

To address this, in 2019, ACCP launched an initiative to develop a group of PRN PAC captains to serve as liaisons between the PAC and their PRN, with the goal to foster a better understanding of how the PAC fits within ACCP's broader advocacy strategy and align PAC support with the College's practice advancement initiatives.

- Each PRN is to be represented by a PAC captain.
 PRN chairs who do not assign a captain are automatically assigned the role of PAC captain unless that PRN specifically opts out.
- The position of PAC captain is not intended to require a significant time commitment. The position is designed to serve as a communications liaison, to enhance communications from ACCP to PRN members about the College's advocacy work in Washington, D.C.

Key Messages for Understanding ACCP's Advocacy Platform

1. Coverage and Payment for Clinical Medication Management Services

ACCP's top advocacy priority is to secure coverage and payment for clinical pharmacists' services. However, ACCP's advocacy strategy also goes beyond provider status. Like with provider status, the College seeks to amend Section 1861 of the Social Security Act to recognize qualified clinical pharmacists as Medicare providers. But for pharmacists to be paid for taking care of patients, it is essential that Medicare specifically establish a medication management benefit. Dentists, for example, are recognized

Medicare providers, but their services aren't covered by Medicare; hence, they do not qualify for payment.

2. Advocacy Strategy Targeting Multiple Payers

ACCP's advocacy strategy also looks beyond Medicare. Medicare is the largest single payer of health care services in the country. But innovative clinical pharmacy practice is delivered across a wide variety of care settings and structures. It wouldn't make sense to ask commercial payers to recognize clinical pharmacists as providers and allow them to submit claims. The approach used when engaging Medicare is based on the same strategies the College uses within the commercial sector and the Veterans Affairs health system, focusing on securing integration and payment for clinical services in teambased environments.

3. Value-Based Alternative Payment Models

Finally, ACCP's advocacy strategy also looks to the future of health care payment. The College recognizes that fee-for-service payments remain the reality in many health systems. But the political environment demands that Medicare expansion evolve under value-based payment structures. Even while fee-for-service payment remains a vital revenue source for existing practices, policy-makers across the public and commercial sectors have made it clear that any benefit expansion to include coverage for clinical pharmacists' services must be aligned with value-based alternative payment models.

"Reintroducing" ACCP-PAC – Supporting Clinical Pharmacy in Congress in 2022

In recent years, ACCP-PAC has made a series of strategic decisions – given the political dysfunction and gridlock that obstruct the passage of bipartisan health reform legislation – to conserve scarce member resources and avoid engaging in partisan political events.

During this time, ACCP-PAC has gradually built up its cash reserves and has accumulated almost \$100,000 on hand to help elect members of Congress who understand the value that clinical pharmacists bring to health care teams and are willing to advance legislation to expand access to services that ensure medication optimization for patients.

ACCP's PAC launched its 2022 election effort by its members attending a small fundraising event for Rep. Gus Bilirakis (R-FL) on Capitol Hill. The event, which was hosted at the offices of ACCP's long-serving consultant lobbyist, Paul Kelly, provided an opportunity to present a PAC check for a \$500 contribution approved by the ACCP-PAC Governing Council.

As the only health care organization represented at the event, ACCP was able to focus discussions on

opportunities to expand Medicare coverage for clinical pharmacists' services and learn more about upcoming legislative action on the Prescription Drug User Fee Act.

Background of ACCP-PAC

The PAC is a relatively recent addition to ACCP's advocacy arsenal. ACCP's 2007 Strategic Plan called for an examination of the feasibility and value of establishing a PAC, and in 2010, given the positive feedback from ACCP members, the Board of Regents approved the launch of ACCP-PAC. This process reflected a recognition of the rapidly changing health policy landscape after passage of the Affordable Care Act and the increasing complexity of ACCP's advocacy <u>agenda</u>.

What Is a Political Action Committee (PAC)?

A PAC is a legally defined entity organized to help elect political candidates. By establishing a PAC, ACCP can raise money from its members to provide financial contributions to candidates for office who support its advocacy agenda.

Because financial contributions are protected by the Supreme Court as freedom of speech under the First Amendment, to ensure transparency and accountability in campaign contributions, the Federal Election Commission (FEC) was created to regulate PACs and campaign financing.

How Does ACCP Decide Which Candidates Will Receive ACCP-PAC Support?

All decisions related to PAC activities are made by the member-led <u>ACCP-PAC Governing Council</u>. ACCP-PAC is <u>nonpartisan</u> and will contribute to candidates who understand and support its issues, <u>regardless of their political party affiliation</u>.

The PAC Governing Council considers established criteria when making decisions related to candidate support:

- Position on key health care committees in Congress.
- Proven support for pharmacy and health care related issues.
- Previous health care experience.

The key health care—related committees in the House of Representatives are the Appropriations, Ways & Means, and Energy & Commerce committees and, in the Senate, the Appropriations, Finance, and Health, Education, Labor and Pensions (H.E.L.P.) committees.

How Can Members Get Involved?

The easiest way to get involved in ACCP-PAC is to make a <u>financial contribution</u>. But because the PAC is about raising ACCP's political profile in Washington and helping to advance its advocacy goals, it is hoped that members engage in ACCP's advocacy work beyond giving money.

ACCP members who contribute to the PAC may recommend candidates to receive contributions. All PAC contributor recommendations will be considered; however, ACCP may not accommodate all requests.

Other Considerations:

- As a federal committee, ACCP-PAC can only contribute to candidates who are running for federal office (i.e., candidates for the U.S. House of Representatives or U.S. Senate, not those in state legislature or gubernatorial races).
- Because of FEC regulations, PAC contributions are NOT deductible as charitable for federal tax purposes and must be made by personal funds and/ or post-tax dollars.

Political Action Committee (PAC) contributions are a constitutionally protected part of the U.S. political system under the First Amendment's guarantee of free speech.

ACCP-PAC is the only means by which the College can provide financial support for candidates for Congress. With over 17,000 members, ACCP is in a position to become one of the most prominent pharmacy PACs in Washington. To do this, ACCP needs the widespread support of its membership. Clinical Pharmacists on Capitol Hill: Update from the 2021–2022 ACCP-ASHP-VCU Congressional Healthcare Policy Fellow

Since September 2021, Tatiana Bujnoch, Pharm.D., M.S., BCPS, has been working in a congressional office on Capitol Hill in Washington, D.C., as the 2021–2022 American College of Clinical Pharmacy-American Society of Health-System Pharmacists-Virginia Commonwealth University Congressional Healthcare Policy Fellow.

Launched in 2006, this prestigious program offers a unique, year-long health care policy learning experience in the U.S. Congress and the government affairs offices of ACCP and ASHP. This provides pharmacists an opportunity to gain insight into health care policy analysis and development through immersion in the congressional environment. Fellows are mentored in legislative evaluation, policy development, research, and writing.

Bujnoch earned her Pharm.D. degree from Northeastern University in Boston and her M.S. degree in pharmacy administration and leadership from the University of Houston. Her postgraduate training was in health system pharmacy administration and leadership at Memorial Hermann Health System in Houston.

The Fellow program begins in July with 1 week at the

Brookings Institution and 3 weeks each at ACCP's and ASHP's government affairs offices, followed by 12 months on Capitol Hill. Midway through her year, Bujnoch sat down with ACCP staff to discuss her experience so far.

Q: What is your position on Capitol Hill?

A: I am currently a Health Policy Fellow with the Committee on Ways and Means in the House of Representatives. More specifically, I work with the staff for the Subcommittee on Health. The Committee on Ways and Means is the oldest committee in the United States Congress and is the chief tax-writing committee in the House of Representatives. It has jurisdiction over all taxation, tariffs, and revenue-raising measures. The Subcommittee on Health focuses on policies impacting Medicare and private health insurance, particularly as it relates to provisions in the Affordable Care Act.

Q: What is it like working for Congress under COVID conditions? How do you engage with your colleagues, external constituents, etc.?

A: COVID has definitely impacted my working conditions. I am primarily working remotely, but I have the option and availability to go into our office. I try to go in a couple of days a week (pre-Omicron at least) so that I can truly experience working in the United States Capitol Building. I enjoy getting to soak in unique experiences such as exploring the building, passing U.S. representatives in the hall that you see on the news, or getting stopped by the President's motorcade as he is coming to the Capitol to meet the Speaker of the House.

That being said, the majority of my team works remotely and mainly comes into the office on an asneeded basis. However, we have a morning check-in meeting most days and get to discuss all that is going on. We also chat consistently with each other and can quickly reach out when we have questions. Meetings with external constituents are all virtual, which allows for more flexibility as well.

Q: What are some of the policy priorities you are working on?

A: Our committee overall has many priorities and contributions in the current Build Back Better Act that has passed the House and is now in the Senate. I was able to sit in on some conversations surrounding those provisions, in particular drug price negotiations. That has been a major focus for the past few months since I joined the committee.

Outside that, I have personally been doing work to help lay the foundation for future efforts in quality metrics and reporting and incentive bonuses for health care payers. I also have contributed to our work around mental health and disabilities, particularly as they intersect with racial equity issues.

Q: What are some things that surprised you about life and work in Congress?

A: There is so much! I would say the biggest thing is understanding just how complex moving legislation, especially major legislation, through Congress is. From committees to budget scoring, to working with the agencies in the other branches of government, to bringing in outside experts, to negotiating across parties and across the House and the Senate – it is a difficult process to ensure that the best laws are being created for the American people.

It makes sense to ensure that there are plenty of checks and balances in place along the way, but it was so much more than I ever anticipated before working in Congress.

Q: What advice would you provide for potential applicants?

A: My biggest piece of advice for potential applicants is to take the chance and apply for the program, even if you don't feel qualified. This is a unique opportunity for pharmacists to get to work hands-on in Congress and is worth taking a chance on if you have a passion for policy work. You do not have to be a law or congressional expert to apply – you just need passion and an openness to learn and grow.

Federal Legislation Would Establish Medicare Coverage for Qualified Clinical Pharmacists Delivering Pharmacogenetic Consultations

Potentially significant legislative language was recently introduced on Capitol Hill that includes a provision to cover payment for qualified clinical pharmacists delivering "pharmacogenetic consultations."

Opportunities for Clinical Pharmacists

In specifying that "qualified clinical pharmacists" should be responsible for delivering pharmacogenetic/pharmacogenomic (PGx) consultations, Congress deliberately recognized the unique contributions of clinical pharmacists in the growing area of precision medicine. ACCP applauds Congress's increased understanding of qualified clinical pharmacists' value in providing advanced approaches to therapy for complex conditions.

For this legislative proposal, the term *pharmacogenetic* consultation refers specifically to a consultation furnished to an individual with respect to a genetic or genomic test requested by a physician. As deliverers of these consultations, clinical pharmacists will provide advice and recommendations regarding the dosage, safety, and efficacy of particular drugs, biologics, and other treatments depending on a patient's PGx result.

ACCP has already held meetings with staff members from the lead congressional offices to help these policy-makers better understand the potential for PGx testing to allow for precisely specified and delivered medical care according to the unique characteristics of an individual patient's genetic profile together with the patient's lifestyle and environment.

However, precision medicine is not limited to genetic testing. ACCP also recommends that Congress explore opportunities to expand the definition to ensure precision medicine and pharmacotherapy are available to a broader range of patient populations. Oncology pharmacists, for example, examine protein expression in cancer cells to provide better information about a specific type of cancer, the best treatment to use, and how well a treatment works.

Next Steps

ACCP works with a wide range of coalitions focused on legislative and regulatory reform initiatives that integrate team-based, value-driven, evidence-based approaches into the achievement of patient care outcomes. The PGx consultation provision that could cover clinical pharmacists in certain Medicare payment structures, together with growing interest in comprehensive medication management (CMM) at the Medicare Innovation Center (CMMI), provides further evidence of the growing success of ACCP's strategy to align the profession with high-profile, broadly endorsed, multi-stakeholder legislative efforts on Capitol Hill.

Working with its colleagues at the Colorado Pharmacists Society (CPS), ACCP has already formally endorsed Cures 2.0 and is committed to working with CPS, ACCP members, and congressional leaders to help advance its passage. The Right Drug Dose Now Act

In a parallel legislative effort also focused on PGx, Reps. Eric Swalwell (D-CA) and Tom Emmer (R-MN) – co-chairs of the Personalized Medicine Caucus – have developed legislation to address the prevalence of adverse drug events and advance the field of PGx. The Right Drug Dose Now Act would foster a national effort to expand the incorporation of evidence-based PGx testing into clinical practice to improve patient outcomes – and ACCP believes this offers a real opportunity to advance the College's work.

Working through the Get the Medications Right (GTMRx) Institute Precision Medicine Enablement via Advanced Diagnostics Workgroup, ACCP supported an effort to amend the Right Drug Dose Now Act to include the following GTMRx recommendations:

- Include the definition of comprehensive medication management (CMM).
- Specify that PGx should be incorporated into the CMM process of care.
- Include CMM within the national evidence-based education campaign.
- Add evidence-based education to increase the public's awareness regarding CMM.
- Clarify the guidelines for improving EHR systems.
- Change to a more appropriate definition of adverse drug events.

STUDENT INITIATIVES UPDATE

2022 ACCP Student Chapter Awards – Applications Due June 30

ACCP presents two student chapter awards annually: the Outstanding Student Chapter and, from each chapter, the Outstanding Student Chapter Member. Application for each award is submitted as part of the required Annual Chapter Report and is due June 30, 2022. A description of each award follows.

Outstanding Student Chapter Award

This award recognizes the ACCP student chapter that has exemplified strength in leadership, dedication in patient care, and passion for professional development through its activities and membership. The chapter's activities should address ACCP's core values of extending the frontiers of clinical pharmacy and promoting dedication to excellence in patient care, research, and education. A key component of all the core values is the clinical pharmacist's ability to work collaboratively within the health care environment. Each chapter must demonstrate its ability to work with other health disciplines.

An announcement will be featured on the ACCP website, and an article highlighting the winning chapter's accomplishments will be published in *StuNews* and the *ACCP Report*. A commemorative plaque and \$1000 cash will be awarded to the winning chapter. The faculty liaison/adviser and one appointed student liaison from the winning chapter will receive complimentary full Global Conference registrations, and each will receive a \$250 travel stipend to attend.

Members of student chapters who wish to apply for the award must complete an application form as part of their end-of-the-year report, due June 30. As part of the application process, each chapter must submit a rationale (250 words or less) outlining the plan for using the \$1000 award funds, should it be selected as the winner.

Outstanding Student Chapter Member Award

This award recognizes a student who has enhanced student involvement from his or her ACCP chapter at the local, state, or national level and has expanded the presence of ACCP through community engagement, education promotion, research opportunities, and/or professional stewardship. The activities of the selected student should address ACCP's core values of extending the frontiers of clinical pharmacy and promoting dedication to excellence in patient care, research, and education.

Each chapter award recipient will receive a certificate suitable for framing and recognition in an *ACCP Report* article and a *StuNews* article. In addition, student award winners in attendance at the award-year Annual Meeting will be recognized during the Clinical Pharmacy Challenge semifinal round of competition.

Each recognized student chapter will select its recipient for the Outstanding Student Chapter annually and submit the winner's name to the ACCP national office as part of its year-end report, due June 30.

Begun as a working group in 2006, the National Student Network Advisory Committee (SNAC) became a standing committee of the College in 2007. Its members are appointed by the ACCP president-elect.
